New York, Jan. 22.

General Rosenoranz is being heavily reinforced to enable him to push to Shelbyville, or to give battle to the Confederates at Murfreesboro, should they attack him there.

The total loss of the Federals at Murfreesboro is admitted by them to be 10,290 killed, wounded, and missing.

The legislature at Albany has not yet agreed upon the choice of a speaker. Great agitation prevails. The town is filled with rowdies from New York.

Judge Dend, the democratic candidate, has withdrawn.

The American press generally approve the sentiments of the resolutions introduced in Congress concerning the French expedition to Mexico, but considers the movement inopportune for their introduction, and the carrying of them impracticable. The Times telegram of the 28th says that M'Dougal, who moved the resolution about the French in Mexico has no weight in Congress, and it is not considered probable that the resolutions will be seriously entertained.
