MADRID. Oct. 15.

The Government of India has agreeably sur-
prised the European population. Before popular
indignation against the insulting Arms Act has
begun to cool down, Lord Canning issues an order,
in which he declares himself anxious to encourage,
as far as he conveniently can, the formation of a
volunteer rifle corps in every presidency, town, and
station in India. The conditions are, that the
Government will give a rifle and bayonet for
every member, as soon as a corps of not less than
fifty members—except in especial cases—has been
enrolled. The volunteers are to provide their
own uniform and choose their own officers, the
Government retaining a veto on the appointment
of the commanding officer. The order has given
much satisfaction.
