

ammunition carriage &c. They left upwards of 100 dead on the field, were seen to carry off many killed and wounded. Our loss is about 50 killed and wounded, including Capt. Best, S. Parz, Lieut Sarell, and Cornet Blair 9 Grenadiers, and Lieut Edgworth 8 foot - were all severely wounded - Capt. Drysdale, 9 Grenadiers, was severely hurt by horse falling when shot. Our camp is now pitched on the Unoopshahur side of the town, and about 5 miles from the insurgents fort of Malahur.

5. 50 P.M.

Lahore 29<sup>th</sup> Sept.

From Captain Norman, with Col. Greated's force.  
To Mr. Barnes, Col. Macpherson, Gen. Gowan.

It is 6 P.M. 28<sup>th</sup> Sept. Information has just been received that the fort of Malahur is evacuated. A party of Cavalry has gone out to take possession.

6. 20 P.M.

Lahore 29<sup>th</sup> Sept.

From C. B. Saunders Esq, Mr. Commr. Delhi.  
To the Chief Commissioner, Lahore.

It is 7 A.M. 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. Gen. Wilson proposes to send back H.M.'s 52<sup>d</sup> to the Punjab. It will be a good opportunity to deport the

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King of Delhi, and to send him under  
safe conduct to Govindpur, where he is  
not likely to have much sympathy shown  
him, or to become again a focus for intrigue  
and rebellion. Do you wish him to be tried  
by a Military Commission, pro forma for his  
life has been guaranteed to him? The evidence  
which can be adduced against him, will be  
conclusive to the share he took in the in-  
surrection, for there are numerous documents  
found with orders enclosed upon them, in  
his own hand writing. Mirza Mahudoo Bukht,  
Bukhtour Shah, and Juma Bukht have  
been apprehended, the latter is a mere boy,  
the son of Zeemut Mohal and the King, and  
nothing can be proved against him. The other  
two I propose to send before a Military Commis-  
sion when I have been able to collect suf-  
ficient evidence regarding their complicity.  
Mirza Khorya Shah and Abdoola were all  
apprehended by the column under Brig:  
Shonors, but by some mismanagement were  
allowed to escape.

To The Chief Commissioner

It is 8 o'clock Am. Received yours of the 26<sup>th</sup> last night. I will send you back a Queens Ref<sup>d</sup>, either the 52<sup>d</sup> or 61<sup>st</sup> 1877. Saunders suggests that, with your sanction, the King of Delhi, his wife "Zeenush Mahal", and his son Mirza Jummah Bukhat sh<sup>h</sup> be escorted to the Fort of Govindpur by this regiment; send me your orders in this subject, and if you wish the King to be tried by a Mil<sup>l</sup> Commission previous to his departure from this.

8. 30 Am. To The Commissioner, Delhi.

It is very sad Shahzadas being allowed to escape. If we go on in this way there will be a general outcry. I think those now in custody should be tried and disposed of. Mirza Juman Bukhat is I hear 18 or 19; he was married some years ago. If so, I think he should be tried also. He is an insurgent and rebel. Delay is only

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productus of evil. Example is wanted. If  
we dont punish now, we shall never do  
it. As regards the King, I will write  
by post.

It is 1 P.M. 29<sup>th</sup> Sept. A 6 pounder  
and several small native guns and wall  
pieces were left in the fort of Malaghur,  
together with a quantity of ammunition,  
Caps, and property of all descriptions. Some  
sick Sepoys were also found there. The En-  
gineers are now engaged in preparations  
for destruction of the fort, which is of  
mud and clay - and strong. When the  
fort is destroyed this force will proba-  
bly move to Unoopshahur.
