Lahore, 24th September 1857.

The Chief Commissioner

Brigadier Genl. Nicholson expired at 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ A.M. this day of the wounds received on the morning of the assault. In him the Bengal Army has deeply to deplore the loss of one of its noblest and bravest soldiers.

Lahore, 24th Sept: 1857

From General Wilson, Delhi.

To The Chief Commissioner, Lahore.

It is half past 11 A.M. Your message of yesterday 4 P.M. received. The King of Delhi on giving himself up was promised his life. Do you still wish the Court of Officers to be convened?

A strong moveable column under
Brig. Honors marched this morning to Hu-
mayoon's Tomb, and will proceed to the Koo-
tub, and wherever else their presence may
be required. The sons & grandsons of the King
and other parties implicated in the late re-
bellion will be seized and brought in to
stand their trial before a military Commission.

Their wives and immediate female relatives of
the King and his sons, are to be told that, if they
wish to come in, they will receive shelter and
protection, until the receipt of the orders
of Government regarding their ultimate dis-
posal. The population now at the Kootub
and Humayoon's Tomb are to be disarmed.

It is now 1/2 past 11 o'clock A.M. 27 Sept.
