Dear Sir

I have the honor to acknowledge
the receipt of your letter No 229 of
19th December 1854 with enclosures
having reference to the case of Mirza
Abdullah Khan.

2. Before submitting the papers
to the Government there is one point
which to be cleared up. The pension
of Rupees 5,000/- Mirza Abdullah
lapsed claims as sole heir and
representative of his deceased
legitimate daughter of Mirza Abdulla
Khan was the son of Mirza
Abdulla Khan prior to the meeting there
were many heirs to this pension and
he adds that all died out before
the meeting except one Akbar Khan
"who was summarily hanged".

3. There was also a sale of the

3rd June 1843 with the sale of a piece
of land in which a statement is given
of the descendants of Myroon
Pegun who were then alive - you
will observe that they were very
numerous and between 1843 and
1850 it is ~~improbable~~ ^{improbable} that their
number increased rather
than diminished at any rate the
statement that they all died out before
the writing cannot be received with-
out further enquiry - it is admitted
that one of the family was known
as a rebel it is not improbable

some persons were active in
the Government in which case
under the orders of Government
contained in Book 11 and
44 of 1856 No 40 of 1858 Miss
Mlakee says she could have no
claim to have their ^{share} perpetuated -

4. In answer to this letter a
new genealogy tree of the family
prepared in this Office upon the
information contained in the deed
of sale of 1843 referred to above which
gives the names of the members
of the family living at that time -
The records of Government were

independent enquiries may enable
you to bring down its details correctly
to 1857 and to ascertain what has
become of each. Reference should
also be made to the list of persons
Members of the family of Mirza
Khalid Khan who obtained separate
pensions from government to see
if any of these are descendants of
Maironism Begum, for I cannot
understand why the pension list
of his family is so large, if he is the
sole surviving heir entitled to this
pension of rupees five thousand
which is hereditary.

5. It should be ascertained how
the pension of Rupees 5000 was
distributed when the mutiny broke
out and of this what portion did
Mirza Khalid Khan receive.
On this point the Offices of Account
and Audit of the N.W. Provinces
would probably be able to give
information.

6. It is most desirable to ascer-
tain the shares of those like Alla
Khan who was hanged or left Delhi
to join the rebels.
