I beg to forward for General Sir F. Napier's information the following Report of my proceedings during the last week.

Basoda
21st Dec^r.

- Cavalry -

21st Dec^r - Sent from Camp Basoda an Outpost strength as per Margin to Nouda. I gave orders to the Commander in Chief of the Cavalry portion of it to send a Patrol daily to one or other of the following places, Ndegore, Reshan, Deydaha and Dammurra. It was to instruct the Duffadas Com^d of the Patrol to avoid the Highways as much as possible and to choose the people paths going by one route and returning by another. They were to keep in particularly sharp look out for any

Stuart bodies of rebels escaping from
Bundelkhand - To this party I attached
a couple of spies besides distributing the
Village Patals in the neighbourhood (all
of whom I have now over to our interest.)
to afford them every information

22nd Nov^r I ordered the Officer
commanding at Bhilia to send out
a similar Prospect to the above to
Munora with orders to patrol to
Dowthera, Gornagorra, Gornolepore
Guinta-Ka-Perr and Bairon-
pore. The instructions given to
the Officer Com^d this Post were
similar in every respect to those
given to the Officer at Foreda

23rd Nov^r One of my spies returned this
day he reports that he and two others
tracked George Shah to a house in Seraji
that at night when they entered it they
found he had just left having taken
fright at the arrest by the Prapore
authorities of some rebels in a neighbour-
ing house, he had made his escape
so hurriedly as to have behind the skirt
of clothes he usually wore, three the spy
brought with him they were of a blue state
colour. He also reported that he and

Had tracked Adil Mohamed to the Neighbour-
-hood of Mohamedgum Bassoda where he
had lost all traces of him and where he is
confident he is hid by the Nawab as he
and two other rebel spies will acquainted
with all the adjacent hiding places can
find him no where nor can they trace
his departure from that place. They left
two women relatives of one of the spies who
have the access to the Nawab's presence to
find out the truth of this. It may be that
the Nawab intends going ^{him} up to his ^{highness} ^{highness}
Shahpore on his way to Lahore but should
I receive proof positive of this I
propose sending for the Basoda and British
forces and their detachments, surrounding
the Fort and demanding the surrender
of Adil Mohamed. Should this be
refused I will D.V. force an entrance
and attempt the capture of the Nawab.
If I remember right there is an
available breach on the Eastern face
of the Fort where a bold dash would
render quite necessary. I do not think
however that circumstances will render
imperative the use of such strong measures
even should Adil Mohamed be concealed
there, of which as yet there is no proof -

24th Nov. Marched at 4 AM. 10 miles to
Andia en route to British to meet Capt.
Hutchinson. Put Capt. in Bhopal and to see
that there were no rebels lurking in that
quarter.
Just before starting a Brahmin arrived from

... they had
been there on 22nd Inst. with 25 Sowars
and a good many Village Badmashes.
He says he is often there with only two
or three followers and that if I gave
him, (the Brahmin,) two of my men
disguised as Villagers he thought he
would be able to capture or kill him
and that he would invite him to eat
at his home and make the attempt.
I therefore sent two Sepoy Spies of the
Xth Regt. with him ordering them in
case this plan should not succeed to
watch Gungul Sing and take the
information to Jurdar Mithanand Durao
whom I had sent on the 18th
in that direction with a party of Mungos
Sowars. This afternoon I re-
ceived a letter from Jurdar Mithanand
Durao whom to say that on the 22nd
he had captured Gungul Sing a
Kandah of Gungul Sing, and Mungos
one of his men. He further undertakes
to capture Gungul Sing who he says
is in the Rayoobhar jungles. His evidence
is not however corroborated by that of
the Brahmin. He secured Prisoner
Mungos denies having ever seen him in any
fights though he has the scars of a sword

Cut on his back and another on his hand
Three Mares were taken with these men

25th Nov. - 25th - Camp Bhalua - Marched into Bhalua, no news
of importance

26th Nov. - 26th - Camp Bhalua - My spies brought in a Bhalua Brumya,
Peeril Lall, whom they accused of having
often been in the Rebel Camp, and of having
there received (10) ten seers of silver to sell for
the Rebels. The Brumya confessed to this with
the receipt of the amount of the silver & that
he said was not so much as ten seers
He pleaded in extenuation that he had been
imprisoned three months by the Seshah and
his silver taken away from him.
As he had been already well punished and
did not seem at all anxious to join
the Rebels I let him go -

27th - 28th Nov. - Bhalua - 27th and 28th - Nothing of importance.

29th Nov. - 29th - Camp Kharra - Marched with Captain Hutchinson &
Kharra 10 miles
Took of my spies news in to day, they
corroborated in every respect the intelligence
given by the Spy who came in on the 23rd.
I sent them out again in the evening
A rebel who gave himself up today
says that about a month ago he and
three or four Willaitias were in the Kumbhraj
jungle with Anant-Mann who called
them up and told them to go away and
leave him as it was his intention either
to poison himself, three Europeans, or

put myself up to the Useful Government.

31st - Marched into Gharrapore 12 Miles.

30th Post -
Gharrapore

To day we have no news of importance.

In finishing the Report of this week's proceedings I should beg to draw the General's attention to the following facts.

Firstly That there are at present no bodies of rebels at large in the Baroda or Bhilwa Districts, and that every possible precaution has been taken to prevent any coming from Bhudlewad, and to obtain immediate information of them if they do -

Secondly - That my Cleverest and most energetic spies are on Adil Mochamed and George Thakur's tracks and that therefore we have every reason to hope they will not long escape us.

And lastly - That the most important of the Merina Parties having been now or frightened over to our interests has a Secy of Alta Can has a Village has a rebel hide in the jungles without any knowledge of it.
