Parliament

Sir, I have the honor
to acknowledge the re-
ceipt of your letter of
25th of the 2^o ^{May} ~~June~~ inst.
by which you request of me
to take notice of the
3rd Royal Family for whom
charitable persons are
recommended, for your
Hon^{ble} report.

I have the honor
to remark that some
of these persons were
recommended until a
full inquiry had been
made into their names
and proof of
their ^{extreme} indigence obtain-
ed. I have however
made further inqui-
ries and am very sorry
to remark, but the best

proof of the necessity
distribution of these
individuals is to be
found in a review
of the present state of
the royal family.
The male members
those who survived the
siege and subsequent events
^{as a few exceptions}
are now considered as
not carrying a large sub-
stance by labor. The
few exceptions are
those who have secured
sums from God's bounty
sufficient for their own
support and those
like him who still
retain the sum of
money secured but
it cannot be expected
to aid in supporting any
great his immediate
relatives.
