b. In continuation of  
the subject you will

books which have been laid  
up ago to share in the  
profits. While on the other  
hand the proceeds of  
the various tickets are  
also entitled to share  
in the profits, and when  
these tickets have again  
been paid in and again  
resold (as appears to  
have occasionally occurred)  
the second paper and  
the present folder are  
also entitled to share  
in the profits. Thus some  
tickets may be entitled  
to a double treble and  
even quadruple share  
of the profits. Besides I  
can see no mode of getting  
over this difficulty  
except by saying there is  
no share of the profits  
and as it would be un-  
fair to charge that out  
of the other book hold-  
ers none of the tickets  
may be sold or resold  
or be redeemed. This too  
by the way is a large num-  
ber of the tickets will

never be claimed and  
there will be an exhibit  
of the State, and I believe
